What would you see at the seaside?

Main focus this week: Lighthouses

Please take photographs and videos of all your child's work and upload them onto Evidence Me. It would also be useful to keep any work they do. This will be useful for some of the tasks in Week 6.

Weekly Reading Tasks

Read The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch by Ronda and David Armitage

https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=46wCRq50Wwg While your child is listening you could pause the video and ask them what they think might happen next. Ask them question about the stories to check their understanding. When it is finished, ask them to recall the main events of the story. Ask your child to build their own lighthouse and cottage from Lego, Duplo or any other construction materials. Encourage them to use any small world play characters to tell the story. You could also ask your child to help you make a delicious lunch.

Weekly Writing Tasks

The first part isn't relevant to our investigation. The part you need starts at 12:44, but there would be no harm in your child watching the whole show if you wish.

Encourage your child to make a boat from a basket or box with a sail for their favourite toy. Encourage them to make a lighthouse from household objects. Make a tower with a light on top. Don't forget to use some objects for rocks too. Encourage your child to move their boat around, spot the lighthouse and sail around the rocks.

Take a photograph of their toy in their boat and their lighthouse.

Give your child the letter from me (see resources below), asking them to send me a drawing of their favourite toy in a boat and their lighthouse. Please make sure you add their name after Dear _____. You can show them it on the screen or print it and put it in an envelope for them to open.

If your child has just started Nursery, they could draw pictures (or shapes) and you could label their drawings.

Read any other books – Ask questions about books and encourage your child to retell the story.

Encoruage learning the Rhyme below. You read it and ask your child to listen. Encourage them to create some actions to match the rhyme. You read it, but miss the rhyming words. Ask them to add them. Encourage your child to say the rhyme with you, then on their own. Encourage clapping or tapping a percussion instrument to the beat of the rhyme.

If your child is starting school in September, they could draw their toy in the boat and the lighthouse and use the mark making writing mat to help them label the drawings. E.g. Child writes **Ix.o** meaning lighthouse. They are giving meaning to marks.

If your child is beginning to hear sounds in words, they could draw their toy in the boat and the lighthouse and use the letter alphabet mat to write the initial sound in words or any other sound they can hear. Words don't need to be perfect at this stage. Asking your child to write what they can hear builds confidence. E.g. Iths meaning lighthouse. Say words slowly and ask your child to listen to the sounds they can hear.

Ask your child to trace or copy their name on their letter too. Please put it in an envelope and address it to

Weekly Phonics Tasks

If your child has just started Nursery, they will need to take part in lots of listening activities. Play this match the sound game.

You can find videos of the stories in activity 10 online, but I would recommend you read the sounds and words instead of listening, as there are a lot of American versions. Also, you must use sounds

Weekly Maths

Make a sea from something blue and a lighthouse (You could use the one your child makes in the task below). Cut out the boats from the resource page below. If you don't have a printer, you could draw your own.

The children starting school in September also need to work on orally segmenting sounds in words. Choose activities 9 and 10 from this site. Don't forget to encourage your child to write some of the three sound words they have been working on using the letter writing mat in the resources below.

Ask your child to sort the boats and place the sets, which match, in the sea. Point to different sets and ask which set has more or less. Count the totals in each set. If your child has just started, Nursery chose smaller sets to count.

If your child is managing this task well you could extend it by asking them to find the number card and Numicon to match their total. You will find these in the resources below.

If your child is starting school in September, you could ask them to count how many boats are in a set E.g. 2 speedboats and record using marks (oo) or drawings. You could ask them to trace or write the number and find the Numicon to match. (See resource pack below)

You could also ask them to find out how many there are in two sets. E.g. 2 speed boats and 3 sailing ships. Encourage them to count them all. Ask if they can remember what this is called. Use the word adding. Explain that plus means the same. Encourage them to use the words plus and add. They could find the number card or piece of Numicon to match the total. They might also trace or write the total number.

Learning project for this week:

• Look at this picture of a lighthouse. (See resources for larger picture) Talk about what it looks like and where it is. Explain we need lighthouses to warn ships there are rocks. Talk about the light not being on because it is the daytime and there is plenty of light from the sun.



- Watch *Portland Head Lighthouse* https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ghAK0i9UHVg Ask why the light is on now. Ask your child if they know why we need lighthouses. Talk about the light moving round to warn people of dangerous rocks.
- In the evening after it is dark, give your child a touch. Ask them to switch it on. Turn out the lights. Ask them to pretend to be the lighthouse spinning round and watch the light move across the walls. Reinforce how lighthouses warn ships of danger at night.
- Encourage your child to make a lighthouse. You could use a kitchen roll tube, yoghurt pots, plant pots or Pringle tube. Talk about what colour lighthouses are. You could ask your child to paint the whole tube white. Once dry place masking tape round for the stripes. Paint stripes in between red. Peel tape when dry. Alternatively, you could help your child colour red strips on a piece of white paper and use it to cove the tube/cup. You could paint the top yellow for the light or use a battery operated tealight.





 Encourage your child to print a lighthouse. Find a two cuboid shape. (Dupo bricks would be great.) Explain they need to paint one white and one red. Support your child as they prints a tower of red and white stripes with yellow on the top for the light. They could also paint their own lighthouse.





• Cut some rectangles, triangles and circle from coloured paper. Ask your child to choose the collect shapes to make a lighthouse. As they are busy, encourage them to talk about the shapes they are using. Encourage vocabulary such as long/tall, straight, pointy, round.



- Watch *The Lighthouse Song*. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=HkpxX89MFOg Encourage clapping to the beat. Use any of the previous ideas given for musical instruments. Talk about the music being very slow this week so we need to make a slow beat. Encourage your child to join in with the actions or make up their own.
- Your child also has some great ideas of their own. Follow their interests. Talk, laugh and most of all have fun.
